Zoe Support Australia ('Zoe Support') provides holistic, place-based support to young mums to reengage in education. Since Zoe Support commenced in 2012, it has supported more than 150 young mothers (13–23 years) to address

barriers to social connectedness, civic life and pathways to education and employment as they embark on their parenting journey.

Zoe Support provides a socially inclusive environment with

connection to peers, support workers and the community, where young pregnant and parenting mothers can access and receive the support they need to increase their parenting capacity and improve their wellbeing.

I have two kids; one is five years, the other is almost seven months old. I have reinvented my life after a lot of trauma.

I can now say I am being the best mum I can be for my kids. Although my oldest daughter lives with her father, that does not stop me from doing my best at being the best version of me. I have surrounded myself with positive influences including a close friend Larissa, who is the mother of five kids. Watching the

way she looks after her kids gives me the confidence I need to be a good mum. I am back at Zoe Support and thinking about my life. I am scared that I will turn out like my mum and not accomplish anything with my life. If I'm stuck on Centrelink for the rest of my life I think I may just kill myself. I want to give my kids a better life and show them how to break the cycle. I want to protect them from the pain I went through, the abuse my mother opened me up to and the uphill battle that I call my life. Everyday is a struggle for me but everyday I get a little stronger.

Zoe made it possible for me by providing transportation, support, and encouragement. I learned how to cook nutritious meals. That's a skill I never learned from my mother, and now I can pass it on to my own kids. I attend a sewing course on Fridays; we make bibs and blankets and sell them at local markets. The profits go back into making newborn gift baskets for new mums. Not only are we learning life skills, we are learning about the whole process of making something, packaging it up, and getting it out on a stall to sell. Zoe feels like our own little community with uplifting support in our parenting.

What an exciting year it has been! A year of growth in staff, volunteers, programs, clients and outcomes and, with all that, complexities.

Of necessity, we have employed staff in new roles, such as housing case management, a project officer to prepare registration for Zoe College Ltd, an education engagement officer, programs manager, two childcare educators and a finance manager. This has streamlined our approach to programs, education support, pregnancy and parenting support, housing processes and administration.

With uptake for programs increasing, more childcare, transport and administrative skills are needed and new programs, such as Introduction to Allied Health, achieved in partnership with SuniTAFE and Sunraysia Community Health Services. Our skilled and focused tutors inspire our clients and we are grateful to each one. Zoe playgroups won the Victorian State award again and were finalists for Facilitator of the Year. And our bus drivers keep the wheels in motion, picking up and delivering mums and babes wherever they need to be, on time.

Volunteers are the backbone of Zoe Support and we value each one and the role they manage, from maintenance and childcare to resources and mentoring. All are caring, generous and dedicated people.

2018 started with a flurry of activity, registering Zoe College Limited as an Independent Specialist School by June 2018 and purchasing our first asset, 270 Deakin Ave, the site for the new school in July. Modifications to ensure Section 9B compliance should be completed by December 2018, ready for registration in January 2019. This exciting development will bring sustainability for some of our services. Zoe also applied to become a Childcare Service Provider in preparation for establishing an Integrated Childcare Facility Zoe Kids. Over the past 12 months, pro bono

partnerships have proven invaluable. Norton Rose Fullbright legal teams continued to provide excellent legal support to develop a second and separate public company, Zoe College Ltd, including arranging public benevolent institution status, trademarking and providing conveyancing services. We are truly indebted. John O'Shea from River Nile School in Melbourne advised and consulted to achieve the final submission for the college. Aspire Architecture provided invaluable support with site plans and modifications, and BWA Building Consultants supported our submission of plans to council. In addition, Billard Leece Melbourne provided further architectural plans for a new build for Zoe Kids (watch this space).

Other Zoe partnerships have flourished, including our Sunraysia Learn Local network. We continue to work towards establishing the Little Sprouts Op Shop, with an intended start date later this year. Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) have been developed and continued with the Mildura Rural City Council for childcare, SuniTAFE, and Mildura Senior College, which provides textile and cooking facilities to Zoe mothers for Learn Local pre-accredited training.

Funding continues to be a challenge and we thank the William Buckland Foundation for once again coming to our aid with a further year of funding; without the WBF Zoe would literally not exist.

What keeps us going? The growth, development and achievements of Zoe mums and children. This year the inspirational Zoe Pride netball team began. Some Zoe Indiaenous mums met with the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner, June Oscar AO, as part of the project Wiyi Yani U Thangani (Women's Voices). Two mums are involved in the Hands Up Mallee Youth Leaders Table; two were part of the short film, Stories for Change, and one mum is a finalist in the Victorian Learn Local Awards. Let alone, the academic achievements of many Zoe mums. With 13 graduating in December 2017! You can read about more achievements in the following

CHAIR'S REPORT

It is my privilege to bring you the Zoe Support Australia Annual Report for the 2017-2018 financial year on behalf of the board of directors. This year has been one like no other as we continue to grow and expand our services. This is the third year of our current strategic plan and the third and final year funding provided by the William Buckland Foundation. We are very grateful that this generous funding has enabled us to establish a sound evidence base for the success of the Zoe model, a wrap-around service reaching out to young women who are struggling to balance the dual roles of mother and student. The success of our service is told in the statistics that follow these reports but more poignantly in the stories from the women for whom we care. As you may be aware the viability of Zoe Support remained very precarious for much of this year with the knowledge that our major financial support was coming to an end. We were very relieved and excited to learn that the trustees of the William Buckland Foundation had approved an extraordinary further year of funding which will sustain us to the end of this financial year and just beyond.

As indicated in our previous Annual Report 2017 the board envisaged a future with multiple possible pathways toward sustainability. The first step has begun with the incorporation of Zoe College, established as a separate Not For Profit entity. This facilitates an arm's length arrangement between Zoe Support and Zoe College, with Zoe Support as the founding member of the College. Zoe College commences in 2019 and will provide VCAL as a pathway to further education and employment. With this in sight, the board made the decision to purchase a site to provide a 'home' for the college. With the support of Bank Australia we have made this investment. The asset will provide leverage for future investments.

The financial bottom line remains balanced and as noted in previous years our apparent surplus for the year ended is carryover of unexpended grants with terms that fall due in the year to come and will then be fully acquitted.

In a small organisation with a big vision and a wraparound, holistic approach, the skill and heart of our staff is vital to our engagement and success. Each of our staff - salaried or voluntary, knows the stretching required to deliver quality service with compassion and to remain constant in commitment, hopefulness and "unconditional positive regard."

Anne our Executive Director remains valiant in her support for young mothers and their children while

chasing the necessary funding that will gain us a secure future. Anne is tireless in her advocacy and promoting 'a fair go' for women who still too often remain marginalised and stigmatised by the wider society.

Stakeholders and partners: we are grateful for a significant number of local businesses and organisations which support our work and a number who form partnerships to achieve cooperative outcomes in the pathways to success for our clients. Anne has acknowledged those organisations in her report.

Gerard Jose joined our board this year and we welcome his extensive knowledge of the local government sector and his experience in social welfare and the NFP sector.

It is a fact that the loss of our local Win TV service has markedly reduced our visibility in the community, however we have excellent support from the local print media Sunraysia Daily and the Midweek.

At Zoe Support, our vision is to continue the outstanding work and evidenced outcomes into the future, but the financial imperative is to be sustainable.

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I wouldn't be the person I am today, a happy and healthy mum without Zoe Support. This is some of my story.

I was 21 years old, I did not have any social life, I did not go outside, I didn't have any support, my mental health was terrible. I lived like a shadow on a dark wall "unseen" I did not have a home nor could I eat. I found out I

was expecting my first child. I was so scared, my mental health got worse, having nothing and nobody to talk with made everything worse.

I heard about Zoe Support. I knew deep down this was something I needed to make a better future for my unborn child and myself. I was afraid people would dislike and judge me as I was a dark soul that lost my way. I started Zoe Support one day a week, them days kept me going. They taught me how to

budget, save, maths, English, life skills needed when you don't finish school. I grew to love Zoe Support. I started attending playgroups, sewing, cooking, markets. I was out of my room, making forever friends and a life I could be proud of.

If it wasn't for Zoe Support, I wouldn't have a place to be happy, a place to be myself,

a place to call home. I wouldn't be able to see a future or be able to look forward to every day.

WHO WE ARE & WHAT WE DO

Zoe Support is a not-for-profit, community based organisation currently operating within the Mildura region, with a vision to replicate the model to other regions of high teen birth rate and low education retention.

Zoe Support responds to each person's primary need in a holistic manner - no other service provides this 'wrap around' approach

While Australia continues to makes strides toward tolerance and diversity, young mothers continue to experience stigma and are largely marginalised and disengaged from mainstream education. Research shows that many are excluded from or decide to leave school, often due to fears about being judged. Research also shows links between teen parenting and poor educational outcomes, and poor economic outcomes for themselves and their children. There are also heterogeneous factors that need to be considered. Young parents have a higher risk of long-term welfare dependency, associated with lower levels of literacy and numeracy, unemployment, social exclusion, poverty, family violence and crime²³⁴. Zoe Support seeks to address this by providing a welcoming and accepting environment and holistically addressing the complex needs defined by mothers themselves and evidenced in the research.



REGION

Mildura LGA is situated in the North West of Victoria. With a population of 53,878 and 3.8% of the population identifying as Indigenous compared to only 0.8% of the Victorian population. The Mildura LGA ranked as the fifth most disadvantaged LGA in Victoria and has remained in the highest 10% of disadvantaged LGAs. Mildura has a strong community focus and good partnerships across health, welfare and the business community, and many have an optimistic outlook, there is also significant entrenched poverty.

In 2018, State of Mildura Report statistics show:

- The unemployment rate as 7.3% compared to 6.6% in Victoria.
- Higher proportions of young people aged 17-24 yrs are not engaged in employment, education or training with 16.2% compared to Victorian counterparts at 10%.
- 21.2% of young people ages 15-24 yrs are neither learning nor earning.
- 8% of households with children 0-12 yrs ran out of food and could not afford to buy more in 2013, compared to the state average of 4.9%.
- The number of jobless families with children under 15 years old is 20.2% compared to Victoria average of 12.3% (p.37);
- In 2016, Over 10% of households had rent payments greater than 30% of their household income. And, 30.8% of households in the bottom 40% of income distribution experience rental stress.
- The proportion of Mildura LGA mothers smoking during pregnancy is more than double (at 22.9%) the Victorian proportion of 10.1% (State of Mildura Report, 2018).

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BARRIERS TO EDUCATION

The research identified the following key barriers to young mothers re-engaging with education:

FINANCIAL CONSTRAINTS

Many young mothers cannot afford childcare. Many are unaware of available financial assistance, while others have an unreal expectation of how far government assistance will go.

HOUSING

Affordable, accessible, stable and safe housing is a daily challenge for many teen mothers. There is limited public housing in Mildura with long waiting lists. Temporary accommodation, such as couch surfing, places young mothers and their children at risk of harm.

TRANSPORT

Transport is unreliable, inadequate and costly, resulting in isolation and social disadvantage for teen mothers. Lack of transport makes the use of external child care centres impractical.

CHILDCARE

Childcare needs are currently not met for teen mothers who wish to study, unless family members offer this support. Places in external childcare centres are competitive, with children of working mothers given priority. Childcare centres are also in flexible due to the requirement for permanent bookings.

EDUCATION

There are no flexible education delivery options or additional curricula to assist teen mothers to manage their student and parenting roles. Schools do not offer parenting training or additional tutoring.

ISOLATION


Support services do not meet the complex emotional and psychological needs of teen mothers, including those who live with domestic violence and substance abuse.

PROGRAM REPORT





Sunraysia Community Health Services (SCHS) trained facilitators deliver the 'Circle of Security' program. This program helps young mothers to understand their child's emotional needs by learning to read emotional cues, support their child's ability to successfully manage emotions, enhance the development of their child's self esteem; and respect the innate wisdom of parent and child in their desire for security.



Bridging Numeracy & Literacy is a pre-accredited course that offers students a pathway back into education. Our qualified teacher takes small group sessions with a focus on individualised support to tackle numeracy and literacy activities. The aim of Bridging Numeracy & Literacy is to improve academic levels so that reengagement in VCAL or certificate level education can occur. Our teacher Paula makes learning fun!





The Zoe Pride Netball Team launched in 2018 and a band of twelve eager mums came together to train and

play Netball in the Lifestyle Plus social competition. Netball has been fantastic for improving fitness levels, inspiring team work; and encouraging commitment, dedication and motivation toward a common goal. Our Netball Team is grateful for the skills and training provided by our fantastic coaches Desley, Margie and Sandy.





ALLIED HEALTH

The Introduction to Allied Health program is a new program in 2018 and introduces young mothers to employment and study options available in the health industry. Zoe mothers have enjoyed learning about Speech Pathology, Dietetics, Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy and Podiatry at Sunraysia Community Health Services. Participants have also expanded on their knowledge of the allied health field at SuniTAFE, consolidating their learning at TAFE's purpose built training facility.



Earth to Table (formerly known as Meals & Munchkins) is the cooking program. Zoe Support has an overflowing kitchen garden growing many delicious fruits and vegetables. Daryl and Simone and Simone's daycare



kids tend the vegetable garden and Zoe Support mothers harvest the produce. They are then taught to prepare healthy and nutritious meals for their families including zucchinis five ways (stuffed, baked, roasted, and hidden in dishes such as spaghetti bolognaise, zucchini slice and muffins). 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Zoe Support Playgroup is a multi-award winning Supported Playgroup offering structured and unstructured activities for young mothers and their children. A vibrant and varied program includes creative play, arts and crafts, outdoor and sensory play, as well as guest speakers on a range of topics including mental health, dental hygiene and legal aid & advocacy, sexual health and education and work readiness forums.

The highlight of our playgroup program is our monthly visit to the Bupa Aged Care facility where mothers, children and babies play and interact with the elderly residents in a beautiful example of inter-generational socialisation and connectedness.

The Easter Egg Hunt, Mother's Day pamper session and Book Week celebrations are always lots of fun and our Annual Christmas luncheon is always well attended as the children excitedly anticipate a visit from Santa Claus on the back of the Fire Engine.

Our fabulous Playgroup Program is co-ordinated by the vivacious and lovely Libbie and a team of volunteers.





Cupcakes Playgroup is a small group morning tea for new and expectant mothers. Cupcakes Playgroup is the soft entry point into Zoe Support for first time mums and a safe and supportive environment where relationships can develop. Cupcakes Playgroup gives our young mums the opportunity to share experiences and develop friendships with others mothers and children around the same age. The highlights of our weekly mothers group are Karen's amazing homemade Cupcakes that are simply delicious, although not quite as delicious as our scrumptious newborn babes.















Our exciting swimming program 'Bubbles and Babes' takes place in the warmer weather terms 1 and 4. Mothers take their children to swimming lessons and water awareness classes. Most of the children would not generally have access to infant swimming classes, so this is a valuable opportunity to learn a 'skill for life'.



bibs & blankies

The Zoe Support textiles and marketing social enterprise program 'Bibs and Blankies' teaches young mums foundational sewing skills required to make burp clothes, bibs and cot blankets, which they then sell at the Zoe stall at the Riverfront Boutique Markets. The profit from the sale of these beautiful handmade garments is invested into making newborn gift baskets, put together by Amber, to be provided to other young mothers at the Mildura Base Hospital at the time of their booking in appointment. Our mothers learn marketing skills as they package and sell the items that they have carefully sewn. This social enterprise enables our existing mothers to 'pay it forward' to other new young mothers.


I've been supported by the Zoe Support team since 2014. As well as being a single mother, I am studying for my Cert IV in Allied Health – something that would not have been possible without the help of Zoe Support. I was pretty overwhelmed when Savannah was born. Zoe Support helped me determine the right course of action for me, coordinated my return to study, and supported me with Savannah. Through them, my confidence built up and I felt strong and empowered for the first time. They taught me responsibility, and to be a better person -- if I didn't have them I would probably be a very isolated, stay at home mum, not studying or doing anything to create a better future for myself and my daughter. To have a place like Zoe gives you the

chance to connect with people who really understand you. We are a community here, we all support each other and help each other out like a family.

HOUSING REPORT

Last year the Mercy Foundation and Collier Charitable Fund awarded a Grant to End Homelessness.



On Intake 2018

At the time of the application, there was a 2 - year waiting list for public housing in Mildura, and as a result, a number of young women pregnant or parenting due to various reasons experienced homelessness. Many were often left to rely on inadequate accommodation ranging from couch surfing or sleeping rough. This unstable housing was not only unsafe but also prevented the young women from securing their future. It is very difficult to seek employment or take on further education whilst entrenched in homelessness. Since the project commenced, 47 young mothers have been assisted into private rental and a further 12 have been successfully housed in public housing, and further 5 in transitional properties. The housing worker is continuing to help young women sustain their housing by facilitating education around living and life skills including - budgeting, cooking and cleaning.

There have been 3 clients in the past year who have exited private rental secured through Zoe Support advocacy due to domestic violence. These young mothers have been supported into transitional housing in collaboration with DV support.

The Zoe Support Home Base packages provide home necessities such as towels, cutlery, crockery and kitchen utensils and were launched this year. These assist a young mother to settle into her new private rental.


WHY THE ONGOING GROWTH?

Zoe Support continues to see client numbers grow annually. With 44 new referrals and 25 case closures in 2017-2018.

The overall growth represents the 'safe place' that young mothers experience and reflects the philosophical commitment to 'unconditional positive regard' which creates the culture at Zoe Support. Teen birth rates are not increasing regionally but there are many young mothers who remain isolated and have yet to discover their own place in the community.

Zoe Support values peer support and it is a naturally occurring phenomena.



I'm Rebecca, I'm 19 and mother to an eight month old boy called Luke.

I left school after Year 8 to start a hospitality apprenticeship. When I fell pregnant I was introduced to Zoe by my doctor. I was shy and scared of new people and excluded myself from the world. I struggled in school because of domestic violence and substance abuse. Working 10-12

hours a day was better than staying at home. And then one day I realised my life needed to be about my little boy. I needed to be the best mum for my son and not a mother to my family. Zoe Support helped me get on track.

Zoe Support has had an enormous impact on my life and my son's life. It has helped me to grow into the social butterfly and mother I am, that I didn't think I could ever be.

Zoe Support helped me complete my Certificate IV in Community Services and will continue the support when I do my Bachelor Degree in 2019. Zoe is helping with tutors, childcare and finding the right support to suit my unique needs. Without the assistance, support and encouragement I've had from Zoe Support I wouldn't be half the mother I am today.

I am now studying Certificate IV in Community Services and can't wait to start working in the sector. My children go to daycare at Zoe and love it. I get to study in the same house my children are in and can see them whenever I want.

If it wasn't for the amazing people at Zoe Support I wouldn't be able to do the things I do now. The support is amazing, we are always made to feel welcome when coming in to study and when we have problems with our daughter's medical problems.





Hi there, my name is Lakisha, I am a 22 year old single mother to a two year old.






My name is Jessica,I am 24 years old with two children. I am studying a Diploma in Early Childhood Education and Care.





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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2018

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Zoe Support Australia is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 17th September 2018 by the directors of the company.

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The directors have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the company is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependant on general purpose financial statements. The financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Corporations Act 2001 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. The material accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a. Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment are carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a diminshing value basis over the asset's useful life to the company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

b. Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period.

c. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

d. Revenue and Other Income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant income is recognised in the income statement when it is controlled. When there are conditions attached to grant revenue relating to the use of these grants for specific purposes, it is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

e. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

f. Income Tax

Zoe Suppot Australia is a not-for-profit company limited by guarantee and is therefore exempt from income tax. This has been confirmed by Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

g. New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The AASB has issued new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods and which the Company has decided not to early adopt. The Company does not expect that these changes will have a material effect on its financial statements.
